Dear Faculty and Staff,

The months seem to roll by quickly, and it is already the end of 2024 and the Annual Holiday Edition of the *Provost Digest*. As is customary, I like to share a little bit about our family holiday traditions each year.

Many of you know that as my schedule allows I enjoy baking, cooking and entertaining. I also do the majority of the food preparation at our home. At Thanksgiving my husband, Dave, asked me what I was looking forward to on our menu. Although I like to cook for others, I honestly do not always enjoy eating my own cooking. However, at Christmas we do have a couple of menu items that I do look forward to.

Traditionally, our family attends both Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services. When the boys were younger, we had an early rise time on Christmas Day as we opened gifts before going to church. As the kids grew older and into their adult versions of themselves, we still attend both Christmas Eve and Christmas Day worship but we do not open gifts until after we get home from church.

We pair our gift opening with holiday music and a breakfast casserole and coffee cake that are fan favorites at our house. For many years, my mother would supply homemade cinnamon rolls that I would take out of the freezer. Although I have her recipe, they just don't ever seem to taste the same as mom's and they are definitely a time commitment. I do believe in her lifetime she likely produced hundreds of pans of rolls and as they say...practice makes perfect. For now, the coffee cake is a tasty alternative.

I personally love brunch. So, in fact, I do look forward to making these dishes for my family and enjoying them together as we unwrap gifts with the fire in the background, Christmas music playing, and a mimosa to complement our brunch items. I have included the recipes in the event that you might also like to try them.

Tater Tot Breakfast Casserole

Ingredients

- One 16-ounce bag frozen Tater Tots®
- · Butter, for the baking dish
- 1 tablespoon olive oil

- 1 small yellow onion, very finely diced
- 1-3/4 cup milk
- 1/4 teaspoon seasoned salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne (I also add some Cholula sauce)
- 8 large eggs
- 1 red bell pepper, very finely diced
- 2 cups grated cheddar cheese or a cheese of your choice
- 1 cup grated pepper jack cheese
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Directions

- 1. Line the tater tots in a buttered 9x13 baking dish.
- 2. Add the olive oil to a large skillet over medium heat. Add the sausage and onion and cook, breaking the sausage up with a wooden spoon, until browned and cooked through, 8 to 10 minutes. Set aside to cool slightly, then sprinkle it over the tater tots.
- 3. In a large bowl, mix the milk, seasoned salt, cayenne, eggs, red bell pepper, half of both cheeses and some salt and pepper. Pour over the tots and sausage mixture, then top with the rest of the cheese. Cover with foil and refrigerate overnight.
- 4. Preheat the oven to 350° F.
- 5. Bake, covered, for about 25 minutes. Remove the foil and continue to bake until the cheese is brown and bubbly and the casserole is cooked through, another 30 to 35 minutes. Cut into squares and serve. It may take longer depending on your oven and how long the casserole is removed from the overnight refrigeration.

Graham Streusel Coffee Cake

Ingredients

- 1-1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 2/3 cup packed brown sugar I like to use dark brown sugar
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans (I use less)
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1/2 cup butter, melted
- 1 (15.25-oz) package yellow cake mix (and ingredients called for on the package such as eggs and oil)
- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1 tablespoon
- 1 tablespoon milk

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350° and grease a 9x13 baking pan.
- 2. In a small bowl, combine the graham cracker crumbs, brown sugar, pecans and cinnamon. Stir in butter; set aside.
- 3 Prenare cake mix according to package directions

- **streusel doesn't sink to the bottom.** Remove from the oven and sprinkle with half of the graham cracker mixture.
- 5. Carefully spoon the remaining batter on top. This is tricky, but it's very forgiving. Sprinkle with the remaining graham cracker mixture.
- 6. Bake at 350° for 25-35 more minutes or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack.
- 7. For the glaze: combine powdered sugar, butter and milk; add more milk 1 tablespoon at a time to desired consistency. Drizzle over cooled coffee cake.
