Both events featured national speakers and attracted students and health professionals to engage in conversation about ways to bring equity in healthcare to the underserved populace in the state.

CURAS Team Selected for National Advocacy Program

A Creighton team of CURAS Director **Ashley Fricks-Gleason**, **PhD**, and three undergraduates from the College of Arts and Sciences – **Alessandra Kakish**, **Alexandra Woog**, **and Cleo Zagurski** – has been selected to participate in the 2024-2025 Council on Undergraduate Research Students Transforming Through Research (STR) Program. The team will spend five

months receiving formal training to become more effective, civically engaged researchers who are prepared to advocate for the importance of undergraduate research with various stakeholder groups. The experience culminates in March with meetings on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C., with our congressional representatives. This is the first time a team from Creighton has applied for this prestigious program.

Kingfisher Names Malik, McEwen and Brown as '24-'25 Fellows

The project, one of three selected, seeks to integrate insights from each of their disciplines and create a methodology to capture the role of intangible elements of the human experience, such as emotions and dreams, in knowledge production.

Carney Publishes Article in *Theologic Studies*

Jay Carney, PhD, professor of theology, published a research article with the flagship journal *Theological Studies*, exploring the foundational role of base ecclesial communities within the Congolese Catholic Church. The article argues that lay-led base communities provide grassroots examples of the participatory, dialogical and synodal church that Vatican II and Pope Francis have called for. Creighton's Kripke Center provided grant funding for Carney's 2022-23 field research in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Read the article.

NIH Awards Stairs \$400k to Study Cannabis Abuse Potential

Dustin Stairs, PhD, professor of psychological science, received a \$440,924 grant from the National Institutes of Health to study how one's environment affects the likelihood one will abuse delta-8-THC and CBD across adolescent development. Stairs and his undergraduate research laboratory in the Department of Psychological Science will collaborate with **Charles Bockman**, **PhD**, assistant professor of pharmacology and neuroscience, on the three-year research project titled "The Developmental Effects of Environmental Enrichment on the Minor Cannabinoid Drug Reward and Cannabinoid Receptor Levels."
